Preamble

James Wiseman Marshall Snr. arrived in Tambaroora prior to 1858, followed by his brothers John Charles and William Clarke Marshall in 1863 and later by younger brother Thomas Wiseman and family in 1887. There began a gold mining family dynasty that endured for over 100 years in the Hill End/Tambaroora area and further afield at Lucknow. Their children and grandchildren continued the family's involvement, culminating with Alexander Marshall's sons, William John, Allan Duncan, and Alexander Walter, representing the final generation from the 1950s until the dynasty ended in the 1970s.

The family continually occupied the goldfields through various companies they formed, acquired, merged, or managed, as well as through securing gold leases to expand their operations. During this period, they sometimes encountered challenges with corporate ethics and transparency, particularly in the context of business mergers and acquisitions and the growing union movement. Nevertheless, from these humble beginnings emerged a family reign that became highly respected and recognised in not only the gold mining industry during its heyday and after but the mining industry in general with family members expanding their expertise in other areas of the industry.

The Marshall family played a pivotal role in the mining operations and the broader development of the community during and after the peak period of gold extraction on the Tambaroora Goldfield. Despite their considerable influence and contributions, they have often been overlooked in major historical accounts. Their dedication and impact have rarely been afforded the recognition they truly deserve.

A contemporary newspaper once remarked, “*They are amongst the best-known mining men in the State and are directly and indirectly responsible for all the money that has been spent on this field¹ in the past 25 years.*”²

Deeply involved in the mining industry around Hill End, the Marshalls quickly established a reputation for their mining enterprises, over the years the family established and operated more than fifty companies, several of which were significant on the Hill end and Tambaroora Goldfield, including the:

- Amalgamated Hawkins Hill and Hill End Gold Mines,
- Deep Levels Hawkins Hill, No Liability (N.L.)
- Hawkins Hill Central Gold Mines, N.L.
- Hawkins Hill Centre Blocks Gold Mining Company, N.L.
- Hawkins Hill Great Southern Gold Mines, N.L.
- Hawkins Hill Reward Gold Mining Company, N.L.
- Marshalls Gold Reward Mining Syndicate,
- Marshalls Hill End Gold Mines, N.L.
- Marshalls Hill End Ltd,
- Marshalls Rich Vein Gold Mining Company,
- Marshalls Tambaroora Gold Mines, N.L.

And expanding their interests to sites such as the Lucknow Goldfield with the:

- Bismark Range (Lucknow) Gold Exploration, N.L.,

- *Bismark Deeps (Lucknow) Gold Mines, N.L., and*
- *Lucknow Gold Recoveries N.L.,*

These companies became leading players on both Goldfields. Through their efforts, the Marshalls provided employment and maintained economic stability in Hill End at times when other enterprises were in decline. The family not only managed substantial mining claims but also pioneered technical innovations in ore extraction and processing, leaving a lasting imprint on the region's mining landscape.

Family members took on critical roles within these companies as directors or mine managers, with some serving on the boards of other mining conglomerates. Their mining expertise being recognised and rewarded Australia wide and even overseas. According to the aforementioned contemporary newspaper, the Marshalls kept Hill End alive for a quarter of a century—not only by providing ongoing employment but also by sponsoring local events and supporting vital community infrastructure projects. Their steady efforts sustained the local economy and fostered a sense of progress and security for the Hill End and Tambaroora residents.

The Marshall family remembered in the Tambaroora General Cemetery is represented by a large grave plot marked with ten pipe crosses. Unfortunately, there is no substantial tribute recognising their contributions to mining or the local community within the plot, or anywhere else, apart from passing mentions in books and newspaper articles, underscoring a significant omission in how the community has chosen to commemorate those who played such a vital role in its history.

Ironically, the only lasting acknowledgment of their legacy are the very simplistic iron crosses, the piping of which in all probability was taken from their mining operations and placed over each known grave. This subtle use of mining pipes as grave markers symbolically reflects the family's deep connection to the local mining industry, even as their broader contributions remain largely unrecognized.

The true reasons for this historical oversight remain unknown. It is possible that the passage of time simply led to their gradual omission from public memory. Whatever the reason, it is regrettable that despite the Marshall family's significant impact on mining and the local community, no formal memorial was ever established in their honour.

Today, perhaps the most visible legacies are the impressive homes built by two of the brothers: James Wiseman Marshall Snr's "Big House Marshall" (Craigmoor) and William Clarke Marshall's "Little House Marshall," (The Willows) which stand on Tambaroora Road, now known as Beyers Avenue, directly opposite one another.

The Research

While this is not about family history I did have to adopt the same principle of family research.

The focus was on the four brothers who came to New South Wales and their children and grandchildren. There are fifty-two known family members, made up of:

- the four brothers, James Wiseman Marshall Snr, John Charles Marshall, William Clarke Marshall, and Thomas Wiseman Marshall, and their wives,
- the twenty children³ of the three brothers who had children^{4,5}, and the children's husbands or wives, and
- the twenty-five grandchildren of three of the brothers, incidentally **no** grandchildren were found to be interred in the TGC.

Once the family group was established it was a case of chasing the deaths and place of interment for everyone found, particularly those whose lives and legacies are linked to Hill End and Tambaroora. This was achieved through a process of elimination, drawing on various available sources and their accuracy:

- Death Certificates
- Births, Deaths, and Marriages Register, NSW
- TROVE, National Library of Australia
- Hill End and Tambaroora Gathering Group, Hill End
- ancestry.com.au

All the above persons places of interment have been identified as either in the **TGC** or elsewhere.

Family Background

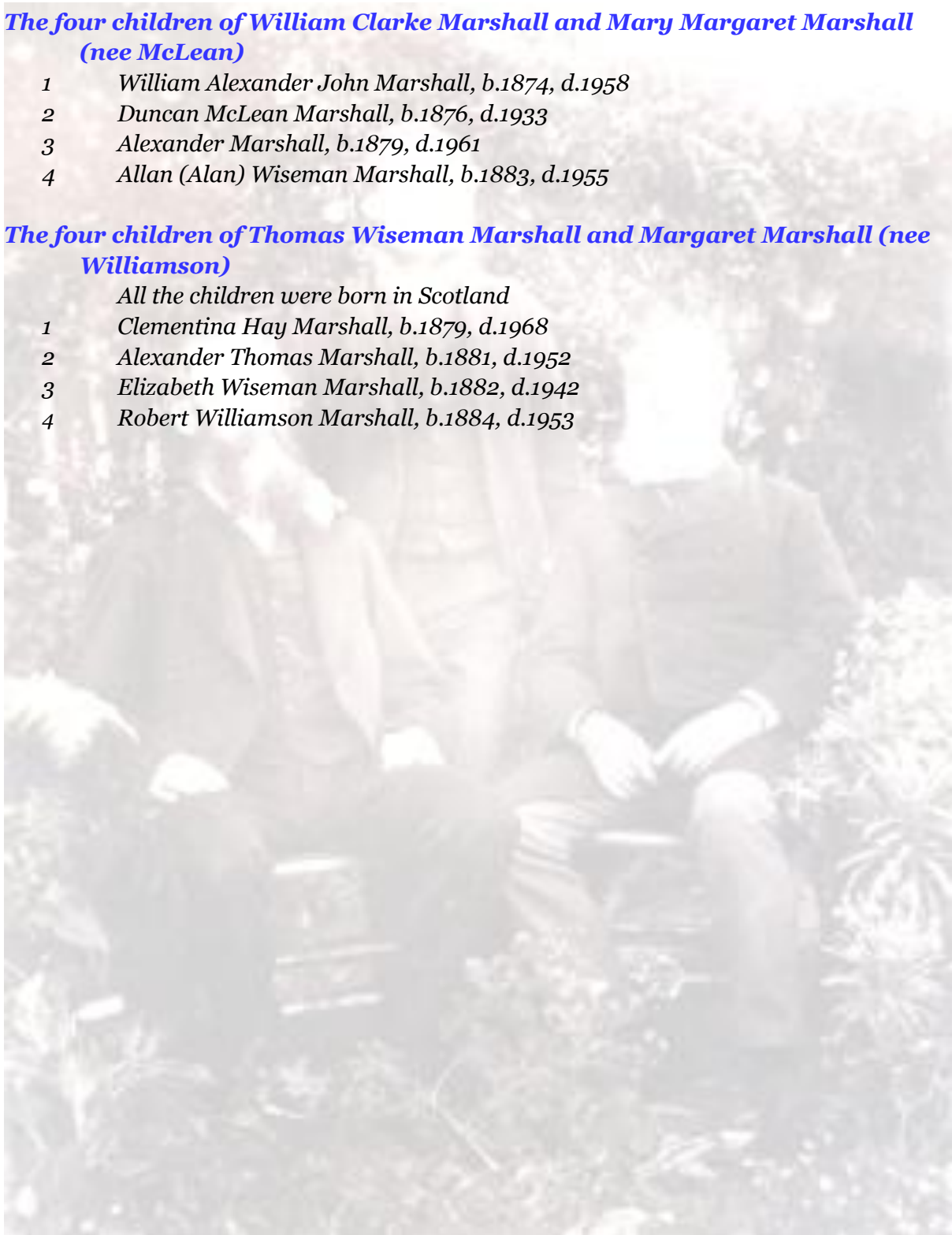

Summary of Interments in the Tambaroora General Cemetery

The interment location of each of the four brothers and their wives, their children and their husbands or wives, and the grandchildren of the brothers have now been confirmed, a total of fifty-two persons; from that we now have confirmation of the interments in the **TGC** and no doubt in the Marshall Family Plot as **NO** Marshall family member appears in any grave row post 1903 when brother John Charles Marshall was interred in 1903.

There are twelve persons interred within the Family Plot, four couples and four individuals.

Excluded Marshall Family Graves

Two early family interments in the **TGC** were the children of James Wiseman and Sarah Langslow Marshall:

1. **Alexander J. Marshall**, d.1858, son of James Wiseman and Sarah Marshall
2. **Elizabeth Wiseman Marshall**, d.1866, daughter of James Wiseman and Sarah Marshall

These interments would have taken place within the original C of E churchyard. The interments preceded the change made to the cemetery circa the early 1870s when the original bark church and fence were removed and the cemetery was enlarged.

Other Unrelated Marshall Families

Only one other Marshall has been identified within the **TGC**, but who is un-related, Clifford Arthur Marshall interred in 1998.

Marshall Family Plot Size

The plot can comfortably accommodate sixteen interments based on the space occupied by the existing interments. The fence enclosure is consistent with that of the period of the first interment of John Charles Marshall in 1903 indicating that it was the intention to reserve up to sixteen family members within the Family Plot with the potential for double burials.

This also indicates the introduction of a list of those interred within the plot. When Alexander Marshall was interred in the Family Plot in 1961 it was his wish to be interred next to his mother, one of those who assisted in Alexander's interment was Walter Hamilton who had with him a "[grave site map](#)"⁷, allowing the family to know where to dig.

James left his wife with a mortgage of two hundred pounds when he passed away.

The mortgage was for “house and land at Hill End being the property of deceased” (Graigmoor), the mortgagee was Henry J. Hall, who consented to Letters of Administration being granted to James’ wife Sarah without the usual Administration bond. Two members of the community put up Bonds of one hundred pounds each for Sarah, Alfred Pymont, a storekeeper of Hill End, and Walter Frederick Hodge, a Carrier of Hill End.

The Mystery of No Monument and the Administration for the Monuments Placement

Harry Hodge mentions in his book⁵⁹ of the interment in 1926 of Sarah Langslow Marshall, “The old lady finally went to her rest in the Marshall plot in Tambaroora Cemetery to achieve the temporary anonymity of a small, capped water-pipe head marker in the rough form of a cross. All the other eight graves in the iron-railed plot are similarly marked but not individually identified. All will come right in the end. When the plot receives its last tenant,

*the terms of a **Will** provide for the building of a large monument with all the names incised into it.”*

The Will mentioned above is the only clue as to why no headstones or monument currently sits upon the interments of the Family Plot. If a monument was to be erected within the Family Plot it makes sense that in lieu of individual headstones, “a small, capped water-pipe head marker in the rough form of a cross” were put in place to denote where the interment was while waiting for the next or final interment. These crosses may have replaced earlier timber memorials.

When Alexander Marshall was interred in the Family Plot in 1961 it was noted that one of those who assisted in the interment was Walter Hamilton who had with him a “grave site map”⁶⁰, this is the only evidence that the placement of the interments was known, Alexander had expressed his wish that he be interred next to his mother and the family knew where to dig.

A person must have been conversant with the Will to know who the last tenant was to be interred in the Family Plot so that the wishes of the Will could be fulfilled.

That person would have had to be a family member or a close friend for them to be able monitor the interments. Walter Hamilton holds a clue with him having a “grave site map”.

Walter Alexander Hamilton was the person mentioned above who assisted with the digging of Alexander Marshalls grave, he was a son of Walter William Hamilton who had passed away in 1954, both were involved in the local mining industry and no doubt friends of the Marshalls.

We know that there are twelve interments in the Family Plot but only 10 are indicated by the pipe Crosses.

*The plot is of a predetermined size as stated “in the iron-railed plot” which would only allow for so many interments, based on the current interment layout the plot could only accommodate 16 interments, not including potentially double interments, so there must have been a list to support the statement “When the plot receives its last tenant”, this would then have allowed the wishes of the **Will** to be achieved.*

Results of Searches for the Elusive Will

Searches to date (2025) have not found a Will that includes details of “the building of a large monument with all the names incised into it” as quoted above.

No Will or Probate for William Clarke Marshall has been found in NSW State Records.

Religion

This is more a generalization on the Cemetery itself and why some Marshall names are not in the Church of England Parish Records (**CEPR**).

Even though the cemetery was on Church of England land it has been proven that it was more akin to a Protestant Cemetery, one of the earliest interments in the cemetery in 1855 was for a young child named Margaret Greig Paxton noted as being of the Presbyterian Faith⁶¹. The Marshall family were of the Church of Scotland faith which is Calvinist Presbyterian and was/is the dominant religion in Scotland, this is documented on either family death certificates and/or newspaper family notices for some of the family.

Depending on who the officiating minister at the funeral was, this would have dictated if the name was recorded in the **CEPR**. If the service was conducted by a C of E Minister, then it would have been recorded in the **CEPR**, only three names are noted in the **CEPR**, James Wiseman Marshall Snr., and his daughters Hannah Marshall and Janet Caroline Watts (nee Marshall). This explains why some family members have not been found in that record, if a Presbyterian Minister/Pastor/Elder administered the service it would have been recorded in a Presbyterian church register if one existed.

Interesting to note that some of the interments were cited as being in the Presbyterian Cemetery either in Tambaroora or Hill End, this would have come about more from lack of local knowledge of the cemeteries status but were at least aware of the persons denomination.

Records suggest that James Wiseman Marshall Snr. changed religion, his interment service was conducted by E.P. Lowe of the Church of England.⁶² He also provided accommodation for visiting Bishops at Craigmoor and was active on the building committee for the new Saint Andrews Church of England completed in 1873, as well as his service on the Church Trust.⁶³

Iron Pipe Crosses

The last interment was Alexander Marshall in 1961, son of William Clarke Marshall, making him the twelfth interment but there are only ten crosses, this could suggest that the person managing the list and the placement of the crosses had already passed away when the eleventh interment being Agnes Jane Marshall passed away in 1957, Agnes husband Allan was the tenth interment and preceded Agnes by two years earlier. Could Allan have been the keeper of the List and responsible for the crosses, and Agnes carried on Allan's work.

The arrangement of crosses within the Family Plot appears to be deliberate and meaningful. The presence of three pairs of crosses suggests that those who installed them were aware of the couples interred together. Such a layout implies that the individuals responsible for placing the crosses possessed specific knowledge about the family members' connections, rather than placing the markers arbitrarily or solely based on available burial locations.

Regarding the origin of the markers themselves, there is reason to believe the iron pipe crosses may have replaced earlier, less durable markers. Given that wooden markers were common in earlier periods and prone to decay over time, it is plausible that family members or caretakers installed iron crosses as more permanent memorials once the originals deteriorated. This practice aligns with broader trends in cemetery maintenance during the early 20th century, when families often sought more lasting ways to commemorate their deceased relatives as materials and resources became available. This is noticeable in the original C of E graveyard.

The presence of depressions in the ground at two interments suggests that the crosses correspond to actual burial sites, rather than again being placed arbitrarily. This physical evidence indicates that the placement of the crosses was intentional, aligning with the locations where individuals were laid to rest and reinforcing the notion that they serve as genuine markers for those interred.

Two sets of the paired crosses are each joined underground by pipe work. There are no identifying marks on the iron crosses to indicate names.

Plot Fence

*The surrounding fence is from the early 1900's era as can be seen by similar fences and is in the second last row where that type of fencing appears. There is mention that iron pipe railing surrounded the Family Plot around 1961 which does not make sense considering the existing iron fence. There is also very old pipe still laying within the Family Plot. The mention of the iron pipe fencing may have been for the sources maternal family interred in the **TGC**.*

Family Omitted from the Family Plot

*It is possible that not all those who may have been listed to be interred in the Family Plot but for unknown reasons were prevented from doing so, an example being, three of William Clarke Marshalls four sons were interred in the **TGC** the other was interred in Rookwood; it could be that the family were not aware that William Alexander John Marshall wished to be interred with the family in Hill End, financial restraint may have prevented his interment in the Family Plot or the family could not make the journey.*

Marshall Family Involvement in the Family Plot Recognition

It is my understanding that family members still have control of the Family Plot⁶⁴. A plaque would identify those interred in the Family Plot and share the story of a mystery that has existed for approximately seventy years, providing closure for the family. The Marshall family's work in supporting the local economy and community life in Tambaroora and Hill End played a vital role in the towns' survival during challenging times. Despite their

significant contributions over more than a century, the family has received little recognition. Installing a plaque would honour their legacy and ensure their story is preserved for future generations.

Genealogical Research Notes, Sources and my Dribble

I limited my research to the children and grandchildren of the four brothers. Records indicate that Duncan McLean Marshall and his wife, Janet Caroline Watts (nee Marshall), Hannah Marshall, Allan Wiseman Marshall and his wife and Alexander Marshall were the children of the brothers interred in the Family Plot, no grandchildren of the brothers have been found in the research interred in the Family Plot.

A comprehensive analysis with cited sources is provided below to support the aforementioned details.

When reading about the interments of family in the TGC below, note that mention is either made of the Presbyterian Cemetery, Church of England Cemetery or portions of both, the cemetery was the Church of England Cemetery up until 1951 when it was officially handed over to the NSW Government. It was just a case that it was assumed to be a general cemetery for all denominations. It really was just one big happy cemetery.

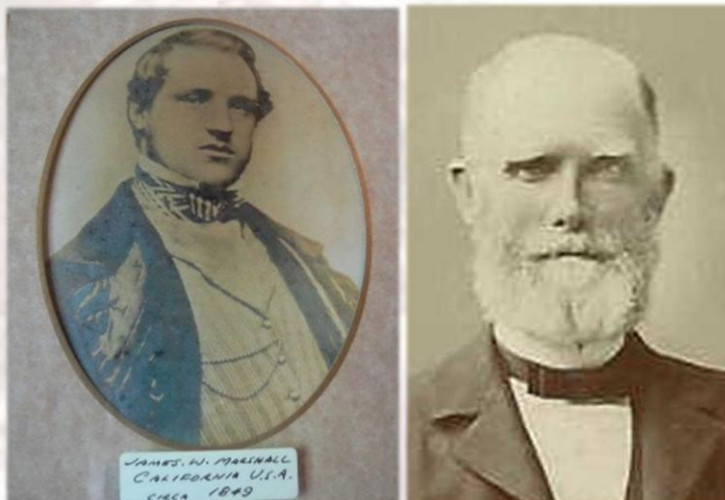

“Death of Mr James Wislan^(sic) Marshall. News is to hand of the sad death of Mr James Wislan^(sic) Marshall, father of Mr C.J. Marshall, Manager for Bergl Australia, at Bowen, which took place at Wellington, New South Wales, at the ripe old age of 79 years. Born at Garmouth, on the Spay, Scotland, the deceased gentleman followed banking in that country for some years, when he made for the gold-rush in California in the year 1849. He afterwards visited Central America, and then came to Australia, via New Zealand, settling down at Hill End (Bald Hill) New South Wales, on the Turon River Goldfields, where he spent about 50 years of his life in continuous mining, both as owner and manager. James may have changed his religion from Presbyterian to Church of England (C of E), Hodges notes in his book⁷⁸ that James accommodated Bishops in Craigmoor on numerous occasions, was involved in the construction of the new C of E Saint Andrews church and was a Trustee, he is also listed in the C of E Parish Records for Tambaroora.

The death occurred at Sydenham Avenue, Petersham, on Sunday, of Mr. Duncan McLean Marshall, a former well-known and esteemed resident of Lucknow and Hill End. Deceased had been engaged in gold mining pursuits practically all his life and was one of the best known mining experts in the State. Besides conducting mines at Hill End, deceased had large interests in the Lucknow district. The remains were brought to Bathurst on Monday morning and conveyed to the Hill End Presbyterian Church. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon to the Presbyterian cemetery, Tambaroora, and was largely attended. The remains were carried to and from the hearse by Messrs T. A. Longmore, H. Taylor (underground manager of Marshall's mines), J. Hazel (manager Bismarck mine, of which the deceased was a director), and A. W. Longmore. The chief mourners were deceased's two brothers, Messrs. A commentary¹⁶³ by one of Alexander Marshalls children describes leading up to and the interment of Alexander:

“It never did get stolen, one of the few things that didn’t, all the gold was, one way or another, except one 32oz nugget. Dad gave it to me to mind for him and when he died, I was to sell it and pay for his funeral. He had to be buried in the Family Plot in the Tambaroora cemetery.

This nugget lived in an Uncle Toby’s rolled oats cotton bag in our toilet cistern at Matcham for years and years and when Dad did die I went off to Garret and Davidson, gold smiths, in Central Square and had it smelted down, then to Wood Coffel and Co in George St. and arranged to have him sent to Bathurst by train. This little grey man suggested I go up to Central Railway and arrange transport – one way only ticket – and Dad was finally loaded into the locker in the guard’s van. The lower locker contained three greyhounds going to the races at Lithgow.

Brother Allan was in Hill End, and he had problems, the grave digger had to be transported from Bathurst by taxi, given lunch at the Royal Hotel and a room to change in and rest up after the filling in, before the trip back in the waiting taxi. Allan said to Mr. Wood Coffell, bugger that, and he and Coe-ee Wollard and Walter Hamilton (grave site map in hand) did the job themselves only again there was a problem. Dad wanted to be buried in the Family Plot next to his mother only when they got down to about five feet, they struck a coffin that should not have been there. The local jokers had interred one of the town drunks in the Family Plot, so Dad finally came to rest in a grave cut on the underlay to get his box past the local drunk and down close to Mary Margaret. It would be nice for me to end up cremated and sprinkled over dad, Mary Margaret and I suppose the town drunk.”

Well at least we know there was a site map of the Family Plot which no doubt would have listed the names. One could only hope that it was not one of the town drunks but an earlier family interment, remembering that the interments crossed a span of nearly sixty years.

Another Marshall family comment regarding the fence around the family graves¹⁶⁴: “And I well remember that rose arch built shakily from galvanised iron water piping over the front garden gate, from the same batch (probably bought at an auction which Dad attended often) that he used to put railings round the family graves in Hill End.”

The reference to the family graves may include Alexanders maternal family also. No graves today have pipe fences surrounding the graves.

Another account on Alexanders interment by one of his children¹⁶⁵:

“Dad died in 1961 and as he wished he was carted up to Hill End on the train. Alex and Allan went up to bury him. Evidently it didn’t go exactly without a hitch because

when they dug the grave in the plot surrounded by the galvanised iron pipes a coffin appeared, and Alex swore that the records showed it belonged to the town drunk. With Allan's help a new hole was dug and Dad duely(sic) interred.”
More evidence that either a list for the Family Plot existed or the “records” mentioned was for the whole cemetery. The mention of the iron pipes may not be completely accurate; it could be that the iron pipes may have been the crosses we see today.
